



Press conference video makes the case for SB 843 CSBA-sponsored bill would protect students from abusive teachers

CSBA's new SB 843 Web page now has video of the recent Capitol news conference where state Sen. Lou Correa briefed reporters about his legislation to better protect California student's by reforming the teacher dismissal process. CSBA is sponsoring Correa's Senate bill, which would streamline the handling of cases involving teacher misconduct that could jeopardize student safety. Correa praises all the "wonderful teachers in public schools today" in the 12-minute video, stressing that his bill is not about them but instead targets "a few bad apples" whose "serious and immoral conduct" threatens children. "This proposal is targeting a small percentage of teachers who violate the trust bestowed upon them to educate, care [for] and protect the students under their supervision," agrees CSBA President Josephine "Jo" Lucey in the video, who joined Correa and Sheila Boxley, president of the Child Abuse Prevention Center, in speaking at the press conference. ### Common Core field test window opens next week Federal waiver ends threat of state penalties

A federal waiver last week removed the threat of state penalties as California proceeds with field tests of assessments designed for the Common Core State Standards. The so-called Smarter Balanced assessments "will give test-makers feedback on test content, design, the technology platform that will be used to administer the test and establish achievement levels," as this new CSBA Fact Sheet explains. The new assessments, to be administered between March 18 and June 6, replace the previous Standardized Testing and Reporting bubble tests, giving far richer insights into students' critical thinking skills in math and English-language arts in grades 3-8, but their content and design mark a break from years of data that federal officials relied on to measure student achievement. "Approval of this waiver could not have come at a better time. In little more than a week, some three million students will begin the largest field test of these new assessments of any state in the nation," state Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Torlakson and State Board of Education President Michael Kirst said in a joint statement. # CDE: Number of districts in financial jeopardy drops sharply

Other announcements on model schools, CTE standards, technology grants

The California Department of Education's **First Interim Status Report** shows a sharp drop in the number of local educational agencies with qualified or negative certifications—just 49, compared to 124 at this time last year. The certifications reflect whether the LEAs are able to meet their financial obligations for the remainder of the current fiscal year and subsequent two fiscal years, based on projections when the reporting period ended last Oct. 31. Other news from CDE includes the announcement of this year's 24 Model Continuation High

Schools, which offer a second chance to students who are already on the path to dropping out; guidance to help schools implement new standards for college and career readiness; information on how more than 8,000 eligible schools and districts can apply for some of the \$188.4 million in Education Technology K-12 Voucher Program funds, the third disbursal from a 2003 antitrust settlement agreement with Microsoft Corp.; and notice of new standards for after-school programs.

### CDHS to hold Stakeholder Forum on School-based Medi-Cal Administrative Activities

March 24 meeting in Sacramento concerns deferred payments to LEAs

The California Department of Health Care Services is hosting a second Stakeholder Forum in Sacramento March 24 to address concerns about **School-based Medi-Cal Administrative Activities** raised by the federal Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services. The federal agency had announced in June 2012 that all local educational agency claims would be deferred pending changes to the program. Currently, LEAs participating in the program are owed approximately \$600 million for past claims. CDHCS's Stakeholder Forum will be from 9 a.m. to noon Monday, March 24, at 1700 K St. Participation is open to all groups that have interest in or concerns for the SMAA program. #### Plans gearing up for Summer Food Service Program Funding available; mandatory CDE training available

Do at least half of your students qualify for free or reduced-price school meals? Plan now to help them through the Summer Food Service Program. This federally funded program reimburses sponsors for administrative and operational costs of providing meals to children during the summer break—or whenever school is out of session for 15 continuous school days. California Department of Education training is required to participate, and CDE is offering both online webinars and in-person workshops to gualify. Remaining options include a two-part webinar, offered online March 18-19 from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., or daylong trainings in Glendale April 8, Long Beach April 10, or Oakland April 23.
