California State Legislature completes versions of education budgets

Differences now go to conference to be resolved

Both houses of the California State Legislature have completed their versions of education budgets. Issues where the Senate and Assembly differ go to conference and a final version will then go to Gov. Jerry Brown for his review. Both versions assume higher spending levels of about \$3 billion as suggested by the Legislative Analyst's Office. The Department of Finance was very clear that the Governor wants to fund conservatively, implying vetoes. They reiterated that they project a structural deficit again in 2018-19 due to phase out of Prop. 30 and implementation of the Affordable Care Act. Click here to view some of the differences.

Delegate Assembly meeting focuses on 2015 issues Over 200 delegates convene to discuss next steps in adequacy, governance and more

CSBA's Delegate Assembly met May 16-17, at the Hyatt Regency in downtown Sacramento. Highlights included Saturday morning regional caucus meetings, followed by new delegate orientation, President Jesús Holguín's report and CEO & Executive Director Vernon M. Billy's report. While there were many issues to discuss during the two days, many discussions centered on repealing the reserve cap and funding adequacy. Holguín said of working toward adequacy, "CSBA is and will continue advocating for adequate funding for education ... we are looking at defining what is the adequate level of funding for education in California, so that we can work in a collaborative manner to achieve that level." The Education Legal Alliance also gave updates on legal cases, along with an Adequacy Committee Report followed by breakout sessions. Breakout sessions allowed delegates to discuss and brainstorm in small groups the kind of future schools they could create if they weren't limited by funding, and how school members could make these future schools a reality. By completing the survey, you have an opportunity to exercise your voice in the association by offering valuable feedback about CSBA services and critical statewide education issues. More than 2,000 board members completed the iCount census, and it is crucial that this participation level be matched when the survey concludes. Expansion of school breakfast program provides boost

Economy expected to benefit, in addition to students

Expanding California's school breakfast program by 10 percent would generate \$42.7 million in economic activity, feed more than 200,000 students and create 1,000 new jobs, the California Food Policy Advocates determined. In a study of economic impact of the federal School Breakfast Program in California, the report says a small net investment of \$2.1 million, or about 11 cents per meal, would generate more than \$40 million in federal funds. Meanwhile, AB 1240, under consideration in the state Legislature, would require an estimated 5,000 schools to adopt Breakfast After the Bell programs that incorporate breakfast into the school day. The bill aims to boost the number of low-income students that eat breakfast at school, which is half the number of students participating in school lunch programs.

Educators and students discuss barriers to success Event kicks-off campaign on student voices for change

Nearly 100 students and adults from 17 grassroots organizations, education associations and unions met May 16 to discuss barriers preventing educational success. At the Cal Justice Talks: United Voices for Change event, students discussed obstacles to learning and thriving at school. Download the infographic of the challenges and solutions that the students identified. "It was inspiring to see youth step up and take ownership of their schools and think thoughtfully and collaboratively about how we can make possible the educational experience that they want and deserve," said Peter Wright, CSBA Policy & Programs Officer. Wright and other education leaders also shared their expertise. A related statewide "Student Voices" campaign is set to launch this fall.
